### About



A QUAINT COUNTRY TOWN EXUDING OLD-WORLD CHARM.

Set against a backdrop of rolling countryside, Bungendore is a quaint town exuding old-world charm. Delight in the town's thriving arts and crafts scene, browse through antique shops and boutiques and indulge in the region's gourmet delights, including local wines and artisanal produce, making Bungendore a haven for food and wine enthusiasts.

The Bungendore area was occupied by the Ngunnawal and Ngarigo Peoples far before the arrival of European settlers. In 1820, however, European settlers reached the area while looking for the Murrumbidgee River and 17 years later, the town of Bungendore was officially recognised.

Around this time, the settlement became an important crossroads connecting Goulburn, Braidwood, Queanbeyan and Cooma. Following the establishment of Canberra as the nation's capital, the latter half of the 20th century saw several new ventures open, from fine art and craft studios to antique shops, cafés and restaurants. To this day, arts, crafts, antiques and wineries remain the town's main drawcards.

### Getting here


#### **NESTLED BETWEEN CANBERRA AND THE** UNSPOILED SOUTHERN NSW COASTLINE.

Delight in the winter truffle season at a local truffle farm, and take a scenic drive through the hills of Wamboin and Bywong to explore the renowned local wineries, savouring their premium cool-climate wines while overlooking the picturesque vineyards.

Boasting a community of incredible craftmanship, local family-run wineries and a plethora of fascinating boutiques to explore, a visit to the charming rural escape of Bungendore is well worth the trip.



The streets of Bungendore are lined with old stone, brick and timber buildings, reminders of its colourful past. Take a self-guided tour through the town's main streets to get an invaluable glimpse of the town's journey from the 1800s to present day.

Spend an afternoon strolling amongst the art galleries and boutiques along Malbon, Ellendon and Gibraltar Streets to unearth hidden treasures of local art and antiques, or take a short drive from Bungendore towards Lake George for a magical vista unlike anywhere else in Australia.
